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Forum for Medical Ethics Society Annual report – 2022-2023

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Introduction

In this reporting year 2022-2023, the Forum for Medical Ethics Society (FMES) completed 30 years since its inception. It continues to focus on strengthening medical ethics in modern healthcare. Over time, FMES has expanded its engagement beyond medical ethics to the broader discipline of bioethics and its various sub-fields.

We take this opportunity to report the work accomplished during the year 2022-2023 across its three platforms namely:

- I. Health, Ethics and Law Institute for Training, Research and Advocacy (HEaL Institute) for FMES' programmatic work (since 2018);
- II. The *Indian Journal of Medical Ethics* for exchanges between non-medical experts, philosophers and social scientists, medical providers, health researchers, paramedical personnel, and advocacy groups. *IJME*, till date, is the only journal on bioethics and medical ethics published from India (since 1993);
- III. National Bioethics Conferences (NBCs) platform for engagement amongst the stakeholders in bioethics. So far, FMES hosted **nine** NBCs in different parts of India in collaboration with other organisations including academic institutions-medical colleges, universities, and other organisations engaged with works in the space of health and allied themes (since 2005).

It also presents (Section IV) the audited statement of accounts for the reporting financial year 2022-2023, that is the assessment year of 2023-2024.

I. Health, Ethics and Law Institute (HEaL Institute) For Training, Research and Advocacy

The Health, Ethics and Law Institute (HEaL Institute) for Training, Research and Advocacy, a programmatic platform of FMES is the youngest one amongst the three platforms of FMES. It was established in 2018-2019. The HEaL Institute aims to serve as a bridge between academia and activism for promoting and safeguarding people's democratic and constitutional entitlement to health. The HEaL institute takes a multi-disciplinary, multi-sectoral, and intersectional approach which enables it to critically engage with law, regulations, and constitutional entitlements.

I.1 Research Initiatives


We continued with **the project titled** '<u>A collaborative research initiative cataloguing key community</u> engagement practices embedded in Implementation Research Public Health Projects Involving Disadvantaged (rural/indigenous) Communities in India'. The last annual report detailed the inception of this project.

In this reporting year, we completed the empirical research at two sites in collaboration with the two partners. Currently the writings based on empirical research are in progress. I.2 Public engagement and advocacy

I.2.1 Public health emergency and ethics of reporting: Learnings and way forward | Co-hosted by Department of Communication, Sarojini Naidu School of Arts and Communication, University of Hyderabad, and Forum for Medical Ethics Society (FMES) and its two platforms –Health, Ethics and Law Institute (HEaL Institute) and Indian Journal of Medical Ethics (IJME) | Proceedings

If there is one thing the Covid-19 pandemic has done across the board, in society, industry, governance and politics, it is to expose the cracks in our material, social, administrative and policy infrastructures. The media, as a key institution that is expected not only to hold those in power to account, but also to keep the public informed so that they deal with the everyday ups and downs of life, struggled to keep pace with the rapidly evolving dynamics of knowledge creation, management, and dissemination. Suddenly everything was thrown into disarray. Journalists could not depend on the usual networks of sources, there were few systems in place to deal with information verification, and had to combat the deluge of misinformation and fake news that circulated on and off the Internet. After things have settled down somewhat, it was important to take stock of what we have learned and how we might be able to draw on the full range of journalistic experience to set new standards of reporting, writing, and dissemination centre-staging media integrity and ethics. How should we think about how we research and tell stories? What ethical frameworks can we draw upon? How do we understand the full spectrum of audiences and stakeholders in the media landscape and ensure we bring an empathetic and critical lens to crisis reportage? While doing so, how do we navigate through the uncertainties implied and integral to the evolving science of a novel virus, long drawn pandemic, evolving variants, and risks communication to people from across the sections of population? In doing so, how do we ensure warding off discriminatory practices - knowingly or unknowingly, and making communication and information dissemination accessible, relevant, and inclusive?

The two 90-minute Round Tables in the series featured conversations among media professionals, academics from across the relevant disciplines, health communicators, ethicists, and cultural commentators to address some of these questions.



I.2.2 <u>The Archie Battersbee Case: Lessons in Trust, Dignity and Autonomy in End of Life Care</u> | Hosted by FMES, HEaL Institute, IJME; Seth GSM Medical College and KEM Hospital, Mumbai | January 11, 2023 | 5 - 7 pm | Virtual | <u>Proceedings</u>.

Synopsis: On 7th April 2022, 12-year-old Archie Battersbee's mother found him unconscious at home with a ligature around his neck. The clinical team at Barts Health NHS Trust gave him round-the clock intensive care. However, once the full extent of his devastating brain injuries became clear the clinical team concluded that prolonging treatment was no longer in Archie's best interests. Archie's parents believed he could recover, and wanted intensive care to continue. They took Barts to court. After multiple appeals, the legal dispute ended with the Court stating that it could not authorise or declare lawful the continuation of his present treatment. Archie's life support was withdrawn on 6th August 2022 and soon after he was pronounced dead.

The Archie Battersbee case in the UK brought to the forefront ethical complexities in end of life care the world over. It is especially relevant in the Indian context. This webinar delved into the legal, medical, ethical and financial dimensions of end of life care (EoLC), especially where trust between the family and healthcare professionals has broken down.



I.2.3 IJME Author's Webinar series: It is to provide a platform for authors who have published in the IJME to present their papers and have experts discuss the paper. This will be a channel for dissemination of the ethical scholarship that is published in the IJME.

The first such webinar on the theme 'Ethical issues in haemodialysis in resource limited settings' was organised during the reporting year. | Hosted by FMES, HEaL Institute and IJME | Saturday, January 28, 2023 | 530 to 600 pm | Virtual | Proceedings.



I.3 Bioethics trainings

In continuation with our efforts spread over the past over two decades in bioethics training, we organised two short duration intensive training institutes in two sub-fields of bioethics, namely, public health ethics, and social science and health research ethics. These were as follows:

I.3.1 <u>Short-Duration Intensive Training Program in Public Health Ethics</u> | Co-hosted by HEaL Institute, FMES in collaboration with Centre for Public Health, School of Health Systems Studies Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), Mumbai, Center for Policy Studies, Indian Institute of Technology Bombay (IIT Bombay) and ICMR-National Institute of Epidemiology (ICMR-NIE), Chennai and Vidhayak Trust, Pune | Virtual | during October 1, 2022 to November 26, 2022. [Program Schedule]

About the course: The field of public health ethics is an emerging subfield within bioethics and is influencing the overall bioethics discourse. The goal in public health is to improve the health of communities, and, in general, public health by utilizing societally oriented strategies and collective interventions. Therefore, public health ethics as a field encompasses ethical issues relating to any societal activity involved in public health; and ethics discourse, frameworks, and principles which help to respond to these ethical issues by taking into consideration the social, scientific and moral context of the decisions

The course was intended to equip course participants with knowledge and skills in public health ethics. They would serve as significant human resource to take the learnings to their own ecosystems and facilitate knowledge transfer in public health ethics in their organization and peer networks.

About the course: The course curriculum has a legacy of 15 years to which number of scholars including those trained in bioethics have contributed. Over time they developed research ethics case studies from the Indian context. These serve as one of the key resources for this course.

I.5 Fortnightly Digest

We started crafting and disseminating fortnightly digest in Aug 2020. The first Fortnightly Digest was sent out on August 11, 2020.

II. Indian Journal of Medical Ethics (IJME)

IJME continues to face financial challenges, but has succeeded in carrying on with continuous publication even after 30 years. Considered a reliable source of healthcare ethics information and policy, our articles are cited by journalists, policy makers, and even the courts. IJME content is used widely for ethics courses.

This brief report summarises the journal's work from April 2022 to March 2023.

II.1. Submissions we received

During this reporting year, *IJME* received 233 submissions of which 154 were declined, 65 accepted, and 14 still in review as of March 31, 2023. A total of 144 papers were published during the year of which 95 featured in the four issues printed during the reporting year and the rest of 49 were published under 'Online first'. The articles included in the issues also consisted articles submitted in the previous Financial Years.

II.2 What we published

As always, four quarterly issues were published during the year.



From April 2022 to March 2023, *IJME* published 144 items, 95 of them in the four issues from Apr-Jun 2022 to Jan-Mar 2023, while 49 were published as Online First till March end. These included some received over the previous year. The section-wise distribution of content of all the four issues is shown below:

IJME brought out two theme sections in the two of the four quarterly *IJME* issues during this year. The April-June 2022 carried a theme section on the theme, namely, '<u>Authorship ethics under the spotlight</u>' and was guest edited by Sandhya Srinivasan and Trudo Lemmens. The theme section comprised of six papers and a <u>theme</u> <u>editorial</u>. The October-December 2022 carried a theme section on the theme, namely, '<u>Ethics in implementing</u> <u>the Community Health Worker programmes in India</u>' was guest edited by Vijayaprasad Gopichandran. It comprised of five papers and a <u>theme editorial</u>.

II.4. Social media presence

IJME use its social media presence to widely disseminate the articles published in the journal. The *IJME* Facebook public group now has 7.9K members, whereas its Facebook page has 2.4K followers/friends. II.5. Indexing

We continue to be indexed in MEDLINE/PubMed, The Philosopher's Index and Scopus. We have been part of PubMed's LinkOut facility from 2017 onwards, in order to provide direct access to readers searching the database. The Table below shows the direct usage from the PubMed database over the four years up to March 2023. We have extended the range of our content to law, philosophy and the social sciences, and will keep striving towards inclusion in more databases in those disciplines, thereby enlarging the reach of our content.

Key terms used:

1. Session: A session is the period/time a user is actively engaged with the website. When a user is inactive for 30 minutes or more, any future activity is attributed to a new session.

2. Bounce rate: Any user session which views only one page is considered to have bounced. Bounce rate is single-page sessions divided by all sessions.

3. Cumulative time spent = number of sessions multiplied by average session duration (in seconds) divided by 86400 seconds


Explanation:

- 1. The number of users reduced by about 36% over the past one year, whereas the page views have reduced by 28%.
- 2. The average session duration has seen a growth of 12% and the pages per session too have increased by 7%, with a slight decrease in the bounce rate.
- 3. The total time spent by all *IJME* users has decreased by 28%, from 119 days in 2021-22 to 90 days in 2022-23.
- 4. We are trying to get the website audited from our technical support to understand the reason for sudden change in the viewers visiting the website over the past two years. We can then work on the issue and increase the site visits.

II.8. Web management

Ltd as technical partner from Jan 2023, for any help with issues related to websites and servers. In an effort to make FMES largely self-sufficient in technical management, we have enabled in-house website management including page-making, uploading of content, and management of the back-end.

We have also collaborated with OJSCloud to setup a new online submission system in place, which we are working towards making live by the end of 2023.

II.9. Updates from the editorial office

Our Editorial Coordinator for 12 years, Meenakshi D'Cruz, retired in June 2022, and took on the role of an Editorial Consultant on voluntary basis since Jan 2023. At present, we have three full time staff for FMES/IJME work.

III. National Bioethics Conference

III.1 The 9th National Bioethics Conference 2022

<u>The 9th NBC</u> was jointly organised with the **5th Global Mental Health Summit** (<u>GMHS</u>) on the theme, namely, 'Mental Health: Center-staging Human Rights, Ethics, Law, and Policy', offering a unique opportunity for various stakeholders to reflect on and discuss priority areas in ethics and mental health. The Conference was to offer a platform for critical reflections, discussions, and debate on critical issues from the intersections of mental health, human rights, and ethics. Banyan Academy of Leadership in Mental Health (<u>BALM</u>), Centre for Mental Health Law and Policy (<u>CMHLP</u>), and <u>Sangath</u> joined FMES as cohosts.

GMHS is conducted once every 3 years by the hosting secretariat for the Movement for Global Mental Health (<u>MGMH</u>). This summit aims to bring together stakeholders from across the world, particularly persons with lived experience and practitioners working with vulnerable communities in psychosocial distress.

Conference theme: The conference theme focused on advancing knowledge and broadening perspectives on mental health, which are founded on core ethical principles of individual and societal wellbeing, and rightsbased and equitable care for all. We invited interest and contributions that question existing paradigms and investigate critical problems that impede progress in the mental healthcare system globally, and offer solutions to achieve improved outcomes at both an individual and systemic level. Our conference programme was curated keeping in mind that there are perspectives that are neglected and need to be heard; that there is a need to meaningfully involve diverse and representative stakeholders; and that we need active and constructive dialogue to push the needle forward. The conference was aimed at providing an opportunity for practitioners, implementers, academics, policymakers, service users, families, and various other actors to influence the agenda for ethics and mental health.

The conference was organised in hybrid mode and was spread over three consecutive Saturdays during November and December 2022. [Conference Program]

Participants: Total registration were 614, 500 were from within India, 20 from other Asian countries, 15 from African nations, 43 from the United States, South America 1, and 2 Canada, , 20 from the United Kingdom and 9 Europe, 3 from Australia.

III.1 FMES-IJME Ethics Award 2022-23

The Award is an event of our biennial NBCs. The <u>FMES-*IJME* Ethics Award 2022-23</u> was part of the joint 9th NBC and 5th GMHS organised during November and December 2022. This was a third round of the FMES-*IJME* Ethics Awards. They were purposed to honour the for outstanding contribution to ethical practices and improving access to mental healthcare for marginalised communities in alignment with the conference theme.

The three awards categories were:

Category 1 | **Persons with lived experiences** of navigating through mental health issues turned into advocates and champions in spaces of 'right to mental healthcare'.

Category 2 | **Youth-led organisation** working with marginal communities on mental health matters, especially providing services, implementing innovative approaches to respond to mental health concerns of marginalised communities. Organisations that have been operating in mental healthcare for less than 5 years and the age bracket of the lead/head of the institution and/or of board members and/or overall team ranges between 15 and 25 years will be eligible for this category. Given the complexity of these criteria, the Award Selection Committee (ASC) may use its discretion within certain parameters.

Category 3 | **Community-based civil society organisations** engaged with mental health spaces, service provision, working to improve people's access to mental health services, working to strengthen public mental healthcare services, and may have explored and/or implemented innovative approaches to community mental health service provision. The work of these organisations is expected to be informed by the overall philosophy of making mental health services inclusive; working towards destigmatising persons with mental health concerns, and their near and dear ones; and destigmatising seeking help or treatment for mental healthcare concerns.

Award prize: It was comprised of a cash award of INR 80,000/- (eighty thousand only) in each of the three categories, and a citation prepared by the selection committee.

Awards selection committee: Deepa Pawar, Founder Director, Anubhuti Charitable Trust, Thane; Ufra Mir, Founding Executive Director, Peace-psychologist, Paigam and International Center for Peace-psychology, Kashmir; and Harsh Mander, Chairperson, Centre for Equity Studies, New Delhi served as jury and shouldered the responsibility of screening the nominations and selecting the individuals and groups for the awards across the aforesaid three categories.

Awardees: Aryan Somaiya, Co-founder of Guftagu Counselling and Psychotherapy (OPC) Pvt. Ltd. [Citation]; Sudarshan R Kottai, Professor, Department of Humanities and Social Sciences, Indian Institute of Technology Palakkad [Citation]; and Ekjut (Together building healthier communities), civil society organization and has been working with marginalized and tribal communities [Citation] were conferred with awards.
